Assignment 02 is a written assignment with **ONE** question, worth **20** marks.

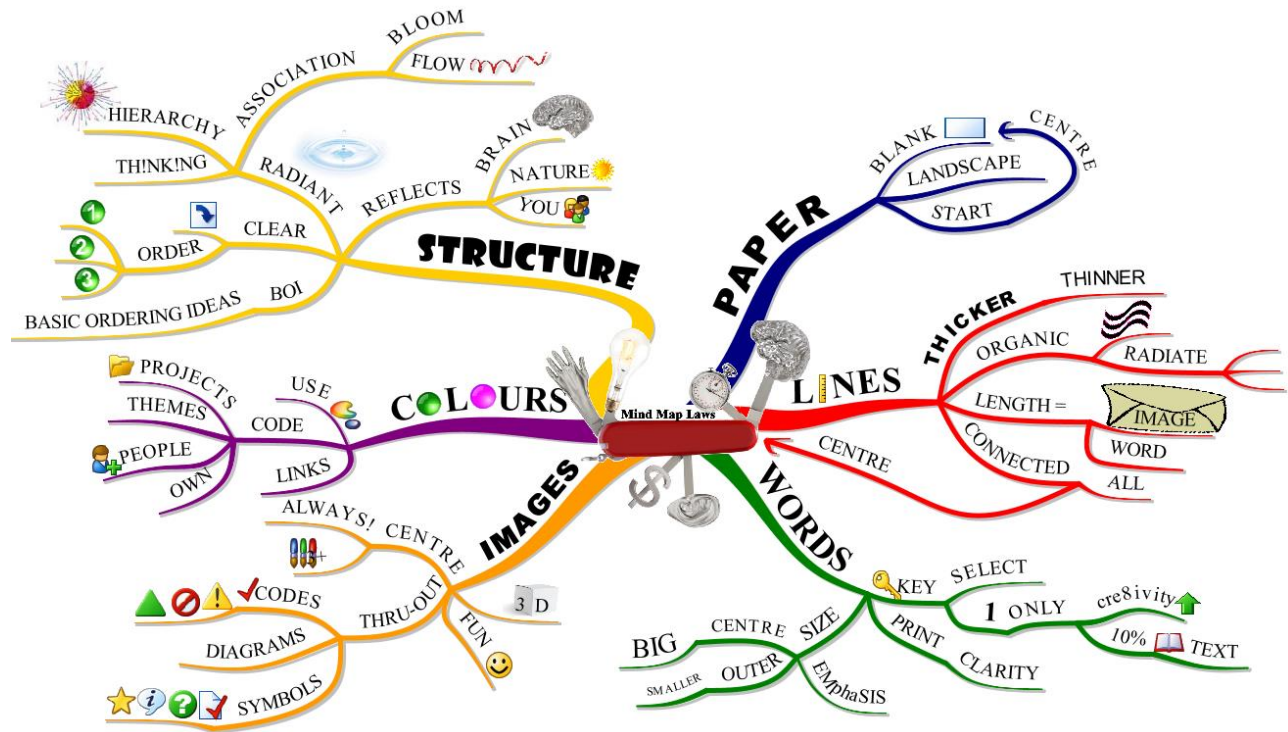
ASSIGNMENT 02 TASK: Read the information below and create a **Mind Map** that highlights the similarities and differences between the scope and application of the **National Credit Act 34 of 2005** and the **Consumer Protection Act 68 of 2008**.

A **Mind Map** is a **diagram** used to **summarise** and **represent information** in pictorial form. **Words and ideas are linked** and **arranged around a central concept**. Mind maps are used to **structure** and **classify ideas** so as to aid studying and organising information, and problem solving (see the example below).

In his books on Mind Maps author **Tony Buzan** suggests using the following guidelines for creating mind maps:

1. Read through the text, highlighting key words and concepts.
2. On a piece of **A4 paper** (use blank page below), start in the centre with an image of the topic (make it is colourful as possible).
3. Select key words/concepts from the text and print using upper or lower case letters (depending on the importance of the idea).
4. Each word/image is best alone and sitting on its own line.
5. The lines should be connected, starting from the central image. The central lines are thicker, organic and flowing, becoming thinner as they radiate out from the centre.
6. Make the lines the same length as the word/image they support.
7. Use multiple colors throughout the mind map, for visual stimulation and also to encode or group.
8. Develop your own personal style of mind mapping.
9. Use emphasis and show associations in your Mind Map.
10. Keep the Mind Map clear by using radial hierarchy, numerical order or outlines to embrace your branches.

Below is a mind map depicting the same information (above) but in pictorial form.
